

INTRODUCTION

Anybody familiar with broad cultural trends can see that, statistically speaking, Christian church membership and attendance is declining in twenty-first-century America.

Many people who might check themselves off as "Christian" on a demographic survey nevertheless do not join or regularly attend services at a Christian church.

And many people who perhaps formerly considered themselves Christians would now check "none" when asked about their religion.

People's reasons for this vary:

- they don't want to be stereotyped by association,
- they don't see the point of going to church,
- they're busier than ever with other aspects of life, or
- they simply aren't sure they believe what their church teaches.

Some might openly acknowledge that they no longer believe in Jesus, but a great many others would not go so far. They believe in Jesus but don't see church as relevant to their connection to Him.

What 'reasons' have you heard?

The "Body of Christ" metaphor St. Paul uses to describe Christians in 1 Corinthians 12 speaks to such people: One Body with Many Members

¹² For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. ¹³ For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves [a] or free—and all were made to drink of one Spirit.

¹⁴ For the body does not consist of one member but of many. ¹⁵ If the foot should say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. ¹⁶ And if the ear should say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. ¹⁷ If the whole body were an eye, where would be the sense of hearing? If the whole body were an ear, where would be the sense of smell? ¹⁸ But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as he chose. ¹⁹ If all were a single member, where would the body be? ²⁰ As it is, there are many parts, ^[e] yet one body.

²¹ The eye cannot say to the hand, "I have no need of you," nor again the head to the feet, "I have no need of you." ²² On the contrary, the parts of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, ²³ and on those parts of the body that we think less honorable we bestow the greater honor, and our unpresentable parts are treated with greater modesty, ²⁴ which our more presentable parts do not require. But God has so composed the body, giving greater honor to the part that lacked it, ²⁵ that there may be no division in the body, but that the members may have the same care for one another. ²⁶ If one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honored, all rejoice together.

²⁷ Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. ²⁸ And God has appointed in the church first apostles, second prophets, third teachers, then miracles, then gifts of healing, helping, administrating, and various kinds of tongues. ²⁹ Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work miracles? ³⁰ Do all possess gifts of healing? Do all speak with tongues? Do all interpret? ³¹ But earnestly desire the higher gifts.

And I will show you a still more excellent way.

How is this membership different from a mere collection of basically interchangeable things?

What difference does that make for individual Christians?
